Happy Hour, LRA Style







The SET is ARRL's annual national emergency exercise designed to assess the skills and preparedness of Amateur Radio Emergency Service® (ARES®) volunteers, as well as those affiliated with other organizations involved in emergency and disaster responses. The SET is open to all radio amateurs and partner organizations, in addition to national, state, and local officials. Besides ARES volunteers, those active in the National Traffic System (NTS), Radio Amateur Civil Emergency Service (RACES), National Weather Service's SKYWARN® Storm Spotter program, Community Emergency Response Team (CERT), and a variety of other allied groups and public service-oriented radio amateurs are needed to fulfill important roles in this nationwide exercise.




What are our members up to now?

My (**K9SO**) North Carolina operating position that can operate both FlexRadios on HF simultaneously (note the two CW paddles) and my IC-706MKiig network.





Mike, WW9X sent in a picture of a commercial satellite uplink truck his daughter's boyfriend operates. Wow:







Did You Know?

- That the LRA Happy Hour gang created their own "Q" code: QRB, meaning "refresh your beverage". ??
- That CW characters include what we call **PROSIGNS**. These are usually written with a line drawn above them to indicate that the letters shown are to be run together. Since I can't type an "overline", I'll improperly identify them by underlining them instead.

Common CW PROSIGNS are

BT (pause)

KN (similar to K, but it says "all others stay out" no breakers invited)

<u>AR</u> (sent instead of K before contact is actually made as when answering a CQ. Also sent when turning over to the other party at the end of your message as in "NW BTU JOHN <u>AR</u> K2OC de K9SO <u>KN</u>"

SK (end of contact ... proper ending of a CW QSO is "73 SK K2OC de K9SO")

These are not to be sent as individual letters as I so often hear, but rather run together to form a single character.

• That the delineator I'm using when I change topics in this newsletter (RYRYRYRY...) is a character string that was originally widely used to test a five-level teleprinter or RTTY channel. The characters R and Y are "01010" and "10101" in 5-bit ITA2 code (also known as Baudot) thus they are Boolean complements of each other. The weather service still uses it on their RTTY bulletins. Hams use it as a "pause", similar to the CW prosign_BT. It makes a distinctive sound.

Famous Hams

1. Yuri Gagarin (UA1LO)

Yuri Gagarin became the first human to travel into space in 1961. This historic flight brought him immediate worldwide recognition. However, only few people know that Russian cosmonaut was also a ham radio operator. Most of the members of today's astronaut corps are licensed amateur radio operators.

2. Les Hamilton (GM3ITN)

Les Hamilton was a Scottish ham radio operator who first alerted the British government that the Falkland Islands had been invaded by Argentina. During the occupation he was the only person in Britain to be in regular radio contact with the islanders.

3. John Sculley (K2HEP)

John Sculley, the former president of PepsiCo (1977–1983), became the CEO of Apple Inc. in 1983 and he is also a licensed radio amateur. The marketing genius remained on the position for ten years and even saw the great Steve Jobs resign from his position after the fight between the two of them.

4. Qaboos bin Said al Said (A41AA)

Qaboos bin Said al Said is the Sultan of Oman. And not just that. The country's leader is a radio amateur as well! Qaboos bin Said al Said became the Sultan of the country of Oman in 1970 and has remained in the position to this day.

5. Juan Carlos (EA0JC)

From one country leader to another. Well almost. Juan Carlos resigned as the King of Spain from 1975 to 2014. His amateur radio callsign is EA0JC.

6. Marlon Brando (FO5GJ)

Last Tango in Paris, The Godfather, Julius Caesar... Who hasn't heard of these cult movies? They all have one thing in common. It's Marlon Brando, one of the best actors in history. And there's more. Marlon Brando was a licensed radio amateur, with the callsign FO5GJ.

CQ Worldwide DX Contest, SSB: October 29, 0000Z to October 30, 2359Z. The solar flux may peak >160 that weekend too! This is why they call this time of year Contesting Season! The CQ Worldwide DX Contest is the largest amateur radio contest in the world with over 35,000 participants. The challenge is to make as many contacts with as many DXCC entities and CQ Zones as possible, while competing against the world's elite contesters. Not into SSB? The CW portion of the contest is November 26-27. Rules HERE. Lots of SSB DX on 10m for the Technician class licensees.

ARRL School Club Roundup: October 17, 1300Z to October 21, 2359Z. This bi-annual event is designed to foster contacts with and among school radio clubs. Participants can exchange QSO information with any amateur radio station, so non-school clubs and individuals are encouraged to participate as well. All amateur bands except 60, 30, 17, and 12 meters are permitted. Details <u>HERE</u>

From the ARRL Propagation bulletin (K7RA):

Wow! Look at these solar flux predictions for October. Good DX conditions all month, But we may be on the downside of the cycle already. Get on the air NOW!:

Predicted flux values are 148 on September 29-30, then 145, 143 and 145 on October 1-3, 148 on October 4-5, 155 on October 6, 160 on October 7-8, 155 on October 9, 150 on October 10-11, 145 on October 12-14, then 150, 155, 155, 160 and 165 on October 15-19, 168 on October 20-23, then 164, 160, 160, 168 and 150 on October 24-28, then 145 and 150 on October 29-30, 155 on October 31 through November 2, 160 on November 3-4, and 155 on November 5.
